SHARPSVILLE AREA SCHOOL DISTRICT RESOLUTION NO. 5 OF 2014

WHEREAS, on June 27, 2006, the Pennsylvania legislature passed Act 1 of Special Session 2006, entitled the "Taxpayer Relief Act" (hereinafter "Act 1");

WHEREAS, Act 1 requires school districts to limit tax increases to the level set by an inflation index unless the tax increase is approved by voters in a referendum or the school district obtains from the Department of Education or a court of common pleas certain referendum exceptions;

WHEREAS, Act 1 does, however, allow a board of school directors to elect to adopt a resolution indicating that it will not raise the rate of any tax for the support of the public schools for the following fiscal year by more than its index, provided this resolution must be adopted no later than 110 days prior to the date of the election immediately preceding the upcoming fiscal year;

WHEREAS, the adjusted index for the 2015-16 fiscal year is 2.8%;

WHEREAS, the Sharpsville Area School District Board of Directors has made the decision that it shall not raise the rate of any tax for the support of the Sharpsville Area School District for the 2015-16 fiscal year by more than its index.

AND NOW, on this 17^d day of November, 2014, it is hereby RESOLVED by the Sharpsville Area School District (hereinafter "District") Board of Directors (hereinafter "Board") the following:

- 1. The Board certifies that it will not increase any school district tax for the 2015-16 school year at a rate that exceeds the index as calculated by the Pennsylvania Department of Education.
- 2. The Board certifies that it will comply with the procedures set forth in Section 687, of the Pennsylvania Public School Code (hereinafter "School Code"),24 P.S. §6-687, for the adoption of its proposed and final budget.
- 3. The Board certifies that increasing any tax at a rate less than or equal to the index will be sufficient to balance its final budget of the 2015-16 fiscal year.
- 4. The Administration of the District will submit the District's information on a proposed increase in the rate of a tax levied for the support of the District to the Pennsylvania Department of Education on the uniform form prepared by the Pennsylvania Department of Education no later than five days after the Board's adoption of this Resolution.

- 5. The Administration of the District will send a copy of this Resolution to the Pennsylvania Department of Education no later than five days after the Board's adoption of this Resolution.
- 6. The Board understands and agrees that by passing this Resolution it is not eligible to seek referendum exceptions under Section 333(f) of Act 1 and is not eligible to request approval from the voters through a referendum to increase a tax rate by more than the index as established for the 2015-16 fiscal year.
- 7. Once this Resolution is passed, the Administration of the District is not required to comply with the preliminary budget requirements set forth in paragraphs (a) and (c) of Section 311 of Act 1. Provided, however:
 - (a) The Board understands and agrees that, upon receipt of the information submitted by the District as set forth in paragraphs 4 and 5 above, the Pennsylvania Department of Education shall compare the District's proposed percentage increase in the rate of the tax with the index.
 - (b) Within ten days of the receipt of this information, the Pennsylvania Department of Education shall inform the District whether its proposed tax rate increase is less than or equal to the index.
 - (c) If the Pennsylvania Department of Education determines that the District's proposed increase in the rate of the District's tax exceeds the index, the District is subject to the preliminary budget requirements as set forth in paragraph (a) and (c) of Section 311 of Act 1.

- 2. The written request will be sent to the building principal.
- 3. The district will respond to the parent/guardian or student within ten (10) school days by designating the time and location for the review.
- 4. The district may take necessary action to protect its materials from loss, damage or alteration and to ensure the integrity of the files, including the provision of a designated employee to monitor the review of the materials.

Each teaching staff member shall conduct the assigned planned instruction in accordance with the guide. Any deviation from its content must be approved in advance by the principal or designee.

The Superintendent or designee shall be responsible for the preparation of guides, and shall develop administrative regulations for such preparation which include:

- 1. Participation by appropriate staff members and resource personnel.
- 2. Continuing research in instructional methods, materials, activities and assessment strategies.
- 3. Systematic review of all guides to ensure their continuing effectiveness in achieving established academic standards.

Definition For purposes of this policy, a field trip shall be defined as any trip by students away from school premises that is an integral part of approved planned instruction, is conducted as a first-hand educational experience not available in the classroom, and is supervised by a teacher or district employee. 3. Authority The Board shall approve only those field trips that take students outside this district, or are planned to keep students out of the district overnight or longer. Students on field trips remain under the supervision and responsibility of this Board and are subject to its rules and regulations. The Board does not endorse, support nor assume responsibility in any way for any district staff member who takes students on trips not approved by the Board or Superintendent. No staff member may solicit district students for such trips within district facilities or on district grounds without Board permission.

246. STUDENT WELLNESS

1. Purpose

Sharpsville Area School District recognizes that student wellness and proper nutrition are related to students' physical well-being, growth, development, and readiness to learn. The Board is committed to providing a school environment that promotes student wellness, proper nutrition, nutrition education, and regular physical activity as part of the total learning experience. In a healthy school environment, students will learn about and participate in positive dietary and lifestyle practices that can improve student achievement.

2. Authority SC 1422.1 42 U.S.C. Sec. 1758b The Board adopts the Student Wellness Policy based on the recommendations of the appointed Wellness Committee and in accordance with federal and state laws.

To ensure the health and well-being of all students, the Board establishes that the district shall provide to students:

- 1. A comprehensive nutrition program consistent with federal and state requirements.
- 2. Access at reasonable cost to foods and beverages that meet established nutritional guidelines.
- 3. Physical education courses and opportunities for developmentally appropriate physical activity during the school day.
- 4. Curriculum and programs for grades K-12 that are designed to educate students about proper nutrition and lifelong physical activity, in accordance with State Board of Education curriculum regulations and academic standards.

3. Delegation of Responsibility 42 U.S.C. Sec. 1758b

The Superintendent or designee shall be responsible to monitor each of the district's schools, programs and curriculum to ensure compliance with this policy, related policies and established guidelines or administrative regulations.

Each building principal or designee shall report to the Superintendent or designee regarding compliance in his/her school.

Staff members responsible for programs related to student wellness shall report to the Superintendent or designee regarding the status of such programs.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board on the district's compliance with law and policies related to student wellness. The report may include:

- 1. Assessment of school environment regarding student wellness issues.
- 2. Evaluation of food services program.
- 3. Review of all foods and beverages sold in schools for compliance with established nutrition guidelines.
- 4. Listing of activities and programs conducted to promote nutrition and physical activity.
- 5. Recommendations for policy and/or program revisions.
- 6. Suggestions for improvement in specific areas.
- 7. Feedback received from district staff, students, parents/guardians, community members and the Wellness Committee.

The Superintendent or designee and the appointed Wellness Committee shall periodically conduct an assessment on the contents and implementation of this policy as part of a continuous improvement process to strengthen the policy and ensure implementation. The assessment shall include the extent to which district schools are in compliance with law and policies related to student wellness, and shall describe the progress made by the district in attaining the goals of this policy. The assessment shall be made available to the public.

Physical activity breaks shall be provided for elementary students during classroom hours.

District schools shall partner with parents/guardians and community members to institute programs that support physical activity.

Students and the community shall have access to physical activity facilities outside school hours.

Physical Education

SC 1512.1 Pol. 102, 105 A sequential physical education program consistent with curriculum regulations and Health, Safety and Physical Education academic standards shall be developed and implemented. All district students must participate in physical education.

A local assessment system shall be implemented to track student progress on the Health, Safety and Physical Education academic standards.

Physical education shall be taught by certified health and physical education teachers.

Appropriate professional development shall be provided for physical education staff.

Physical education classes shall have a teacher-student ratio comparable to those of other courses.

Other School Based Activities

7 CFR Sec. 210.10, 220.8 Drinking water shall be available and accessible to students, without restriction and at no cost to the student, at all meal periods and throughout the school day.

Students shall be provided adequate time to eat: ten (10) minutes sit down time for breakfast; twenty (20) minutes sit down time for lunch.

Students shall have access to hand washing or sanitizing before meals and snacks.

Students and parents/guardians may be involved in menu selections through various means.

To the extent possible, the district shall utilize available funding and outside programs to enhance student wellness.

Food shall not be used in the schools as a reward or punishment.

The district shall provide appropriate training to all staff on the components of the Student Wellness Policy.

Goals of the Student Wellness Policy shall be considered in planning all school based activities.

Fundraising projects submitted for approval shall be supportive of healthy eating and student wellness.

Administrators, teachers, food service personnel, students, parents/guardians and community members shall be encouraged to serve as positive role models through district programs, communications and outreach efforts.

The district shall support the efforts of parents/guardians to provide a healthy diet and daily physical activity for children by communicating relevant information through various methods.

Nutrition Standards/Guidelines

All foods available in district schools during the school day shall be offered to students with consideration for promoting student health and reducing childhood obesity.

RESOLUTION NO. 6 of 2014

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SCHOOL DIRECTORS OF THE SHARPSVILLE AREA SCHOOL DISTRICT OPPOSING THE COMMON CORE STATE STANDARDS INITIATIVE

WHEREAS, the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) are a set of academic standards, promoted and supported by two private membership organizations, namely, the National Governor's Association (NGA) and the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) as a method for conforming American students to uniform ("one size fits all") achievement goals to make them more competitive in a global marketplace; and

WHEREAS, the NGA and the CCSSO received tens of millions of dollars from private third parties to advocate for and develop the CCSS initiative, created the CCSS through a process that was not subject to any freedom of information acts or other sunshine laws, and never piloted the CCSS; and

WHEREAS, no official financial analysis has been performed to determine the cost to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania or to the individual school districts, and outside estimates have determined that the costs could be high and result in more unfunded mandates; and

WHEREAS, the CCSS is neither research-based nor internationally benchmarked, and additionally was not piloted before adoption; and

WHEREAS, even though Federal Law prohibits the federalizing of curriculum, the Obama Administration accepted the CCSS initiative and used 2009 Stimulus Bill money to <u>reward</u> the states that were most committed to the President's CCSS agenda; but, failed to give states, legislatures and citizens time to evaluate the CCSS before having to commit to the CCSS; and

WHEREAS, the NGA and CCSSO, in concert with the same corporations developing the CCSS "assessments", caused the creation of new textbooks, digital media and other teaching materials aligned to the CCSS which must be purchased and adopted by local school districts, in order that students may effectively compete on CCSS 'assessments', and

WHEREAS, the CCSS includes federally-funded testing;

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of School Directors of the Sharpsville Area School District, as follows:

RESOLVED, that the Sharpsville Area School District does not subscribe to a one size fits all approach to education and supports providing broad education choices to parents and children at the state and local levels, and

RESOLVED, that the Sharpsville Area School District recognizes the CCSS as an inappropriate overreach to standardize and control the education of our children so that they will conform to a preconceived level of "proficiency", and

RESOLVED, that the Sharpsville Area School District rejects the collection of personal student data for any non-educational purpose without the prior written consent of an adult student or a child student's parent or guardian and that it rejects the sharing of such personal data, without the prior written consent of an adult student or a child student's parent or guardian, with any person or entity other than that which is covered under school district policy or with education agencies within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and

RESOLVED, that the Board of School Directors of the Sharpsville Area School District hereby officially advises the Pennsylvania Board of Education, the Pennsylvania Secretary of Education, the Governor of Pennsylvania, the Senate's and House of Representatives' Education Committees and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission that it opposes the Common Core State Standard Initiative.

WHEREAS, Article 2 Section 9 of the CBA provides a procedure for tuition reimbursement so that an employee who first obtains the consent of the Superintendent and attends an accredited institution may obtain tuition reimbursement and credit incentive payments resulting therefrom; and

WHEREAS, a dispute has arisen as to whether the Grievant timely followed the proper procedure outlined in the CBA which would entitle her to the requested tuition reimbursement; and

WHEREAS, the Grievant and the Association have requested that the procedural requirements of Article 2 Section 9 of the CBA be waived in this particular instance and that the Grievant receive Seven Hundred Twenty and No/100ths (\$720.00) Dollars as tuition reimbursement for the course that she satisfactorily completed; and

WHEREAS, the District, the Grievant and the Association have agreed to resolve this grievance under the following terms and conditions.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein and intending to be legally bound hereby, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The District shall remit to the Grievant the sum of Seven Hundred Twenty and No/100ths (\$720.00) Dollars same representing full tuition reimbursement for the course that she satisfactorily completed. The written request for tuition reimbursement submitted by the Grievant is hereby accepted by the District as if timely submitted under Article 2 Section 9 of the CBA.
- 2. This Memorandum of Understanding applies solely to the Grievant, Carol Houck,. No other employee of the District shall be entitled to the same accommodation or waiver or amendment of any term or provision of the parties CBA without a separate written agreement between the District and the Association.
- 3. The parties agree that this Memorandum of Understanding does not establish a precedent or practice between the parties and that it will not be cited as a precedent of any alleged practice by either the District or the Association, nor shall it be introduced, referred to, or in any

other way utilized in any subsequent arbitration, litigation, or administrative hearing except as may be necessary to enforce its provisions and terms.

- 4. The parties further agree that this Memorandum of Understanding shall not constitute nor be used as evidence of a waiver of rights of either party with respect to any issues now or in the future that may arise between the parties hereto.
- 5. Under no circumstances is this Memorandum of Understanding to be construed in any manner so as to modify the parties' current CBA. The parties continue to maintain their respective rights and obligations under the current CBA.
- 6. By signing this Memorandum of Understanding, the parties hereto acknowledge and agree that they have read and fully understand this agreement and enter into it freely and voluntarily and that there are no written or oral understandings or agreements that are not otherwise set forth herein.
- 7. This Memorandum of Understanding shall become effective the date of execution by the party last executing this Memorandum of Understanding.

Educational Community

The Sharpsville Area School District lies in a rural community located in the western region of Mercer County, Pennsylvania, is comprised of the Boroughs of Sharpsville and Clark and the Township of South Pymatuning. The school district, which encompasses 29.3 square miles, is a one-campus setting with a K-5 Elementary School, a 6-8 Middle School and a 9-12 High School. The Central Office is located off campus and currently has two years to evacuate this lease. The district employs approximately 100 staff members, including nine administrators. The annual budget is approximately \$15,000,000.

As of this date the total district enrollment is 1,319 students. Kindergarten students are enrolled on a half-day basis with an additional daily half-day of instruction/enrichment for those students who are found to be "at risk". The close proximity of the campus arrangement allows the district to coordinate and use staff and facilities efficiently. Additionally, it ensures unified and consistent curriculum implementation and enables the use of data-driven decisions in its everyday instruction. A final benefit of this close proximity includes increased staff discussion regarding professional development issues and the opportunity to observe each other in the teaching environment.

There are few industries in the attendance, with those of stature being Dean Dairy Sharpsville Container and some banks. The community is very supportive of the school district and a high percentage of the residents are Sharpsville graduates. The Sharpsville Police provide service and protecting to students and employees of the district through an arrangement with the Borough of Sharpsville. There are many resources for the students for recreation and extra-curricular activities, for example Buhl Park, in order to meet their needs.

The school district is viewed as the center of the community and provides opportunities for community partnerships through the use of our fields, gymnasiums, classrooms and auditorium. The Booster Club Tournament and the Buddy Guerino Tournament are just two examples of ways in which the community and the school district work together to help raise funds and provide opportunities for students. The school district also provides after school tutoring and summer camps for students to enjoy by providing enrichment and remediation for students that are willing to attend activities during the summer. Community members are encouraged to become a part of the school culture and have input into the hiring of principals, Special Education Plan, PTO and other organizations within the district. There appears to be a very good relationship between the school district and members of the community.

The Sharpsville Area Area School District continues to employ a "regressed discrepancy model" which measures the disparity between a student's ability and achievement in order to determine the presence or absence of a learning disability. In completing the identification process the district strictly adheres to the BSE guidelines for identification process and the regulations and statutes associated with that process as it relates to the identification of students with learning disabilities.

The District utilizes the BSE Evaluation Report Format and conducts a thorough examination of the following information/materials: a review of student records; a review of the information gathered through the IST processes; the presenting problem; the parent information and available evaluations received from the parent; teacher collected assessment and performance data in addition to observations including related services and/or information provided by other providers as well as their recommendations; a classroom observation of the student's performance related to the presenting problem; a review of the students applicable work products; a review of the student's performance on a variety of normative data and classroom/district performance indicators such as PSSA Data, 4-Sight, etc. as well as teacher generated assessments; applicable adaptive, functional, behavioral, and transition assessments; English language proficiency; environmental and economic disadvantage; cultural factors; and a determination of other existing educational disabilities. How the student has responded to classroom and other interventions is incorporated, as appropriate. The following assessments are addressed in the written evaluation report:

- whether the child has a specific learning disability;

The District follows the procedures as outlined in the state standards and regulations whereby the District IEP teams consider the full continuum of services from the regular education classroom to private institutions when determining the best programs and services for each child. A multitude of supplementary aids and services to support students in the District's regular education environment are first considered prior to any consideration of alternative programming. PDE, PaTTAN, MIU IV and other agencies have provided trainings to ensure the LRE is utilized at the best extent possible for each student. Some of these trainings include:

- 1. Research based direct instruction models for Langauge Arts and Mathematics
- 2. Co-Teaching/Co-Planning training
- ${\bf 3. \ Class room\ walk throughs\ of\ District\ inclusive\ class rooms}$
- 4. Behavior Support Training
- 5. Adaptation and Modification training

Other notable strengths and effective practices to ensure maximum integration include:

- Positive community and interagency relationships.
- Expertise of direct service staff with willingness to advance their skills.
- Family participation in family support activities (i.e. open houses, local parent trainings, LTF). Parent Engagement Activities
- Access to a wide variety of staff development and training opportunities including,
 FBA training, Positive Behavior Support, De-escalation and Safety Mechanics, Indicator 13

and Indicator 14 Transition, IEP Development, improving writing of goals and objectives, Supplementary Aides and Services, SAS

- Graduation rate within range.
- Drop out rate within range.
- High parent participation in IEP and other team meetings.

Equipment

The SASD IEP format lists 19 examples of potential equipment that can be considered for students to be successful in the regular ed. setting. Other equipment beyond the 19 listed in the IEP are also considered/imbedded at the IEP meeting. Sample equipment includes such things as adaptive keyboards, pointing devises, mice, trackballs, and joysticks. Other items include digitized speech devises, portable word processors, screen readers, single switch access and talking word processors are some of the many examples of equipment that are available to meet the students' needs.

Instructional Strategies The SASD IEP format lists 26 examples of potential Aids/Services that can be considered for students to be successful in the regular ed. setting. Other Aids/Services beyond the 26 listed in the IEP are also considered/imbedded at the IEP meeting. Strategies include structured study guides, replacement curriculums, extra skill practice, skeletal outlines, what you need to know charts, information organizers and differentiated curriculum.

Modifications and SDI

The SASD IEP format lists 22 examples of potential Modifications/SDI that can be considered for students to be successful in the regular ed. setting. Others beyond the 22 listed in the IEP are also considered/imbedded at the IEP meeting. Examples include additional time, assistance from special teacher/aide, alternative assignments/tests, multiple test sessions, allow verbal explanation, and accepting spelling approximations are a few of the examples of the modifications and/or SDI offered.

The SPP indicates that the Sharpsville Area Elementary School had a score of 84. The Sharpsville Area Middle School had a score of 90, and the Sharpsville Area Senior High School had a score of 87.6. All of these scores were in the higher levels of student performance in Mercer County, with the Middle School being ranked first in Mercer County. In the area of percentage of students enrolled in special education, the Elementary center has .52% gifted and 15.42% special education. The Middle School has 3.73% gifted and 9.9% identified as special education and finally the High School has 2.15% gifted and 10.57% identified as special education. We currently have 4 students placed out of the District, 2 in Autistic Support classrooms and 2 in Emotional Support classrooms. Their placement was determined by the fact that the home school could not provide FAPE. This was discussed and approved in an IEP meeting with the appropriate NOREP and parental approval.

Behavior Support Services

The following is a summary of the School District Policy:

Any eligible student who exhibits behavior problems which interfere with the student's ability to learn must have a program of behavior management. This behavior management plan will be included in the Individualized Education Program (IEP) and shall:

- 1. primarily focus on positive rather than negative measures.
- 2. Use interventions that are the least intrusive necessary.
- 3. Not substitute aversive techniques, restraints or discipline for the systematic application of behavior change techniques.
- 4. Only use techniques for which the staff has been adequately trained.

The behavior management policy represents a three (3) tier hierarchical model based upon the best practices sited in the current professional literature. The policy also presents an array of models from which to choose depending upon staff training and type of behaviors which require attention. The three (3) levels of intervention are:

Level I — Good classroom management strategies. Level I does not require a behavior management program attached to the IEP.

Level II — Specific interventions designed for individual students. Level II requires a behavior management program attachment to the IEP.

Level III — Very restrictive interventions which can only be considered after Level II interventions are determined ineffective. Level III interventions require the IEP team to reconvene.

Intensive Interagency/Ensuring FAPE/Hard to Place Students

The SASD is not having difficulty ensuring FAPE for any individual students or disability category. If/when this should occur, the SASD IEP teams would link with MIU IV, PaTTAN Pittsburgh and other Intensive Interagency Consultants and/or CAASP to attempt to ensure FAPE for the child.

The District is investigating the opportunities to add Autistic Support classrooms and an Emotional Support classroom in order to increase service in our home school.

Strengths and Highlights

The SASD provides the continuum of programs and services to meet the needs of the special needs population. The success of the program can be measured via the annual Penn Data Reports. Generally speaking, this data reveals the district is aligned, and at times exceeds, state expectations in areas such as Graduation Rates, Drop Out Rates, Participation Rates, and Educational Environments. The most current noteworthy items at the High School, Middle School and Elementary school levels are as follows:

With High School Transition Services, the high school staff has dramatically increased the number of students participating with the Mercer County Career Center and has also dramatically increased the number of students linked with the local Office of Vocational Rehabilitation to support their desired post-school outcomes. Community Based Education plays an intrical role for inclusive programming and services.

The Middle School provides inclusion experiences for students particularly in the content area of Language Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies whereby an extensive amount of Co-Planning/Co-Teaching was implemented.

At the Elementary Building level, there has been a dramatic decrease in the need for the referral and/or placement of students in special education programs. Limitation and restructuring of pull-out replacement curriculums and further investigation of more inclusive instruction models to meet student needs has been an on-going goal. The partnership with Title, IST, Special Education and Regular Education staff has played a significant role in with student success. Itinerant and Supplemental Services are provided for all students in all of the disability categories in all three buildings. If Full-Time Services are warranted, the SASD seeks alternative programs for these students if this level of service is not feasible for the District at any given time.

MIU IV SPECIAL EDUCATION FAIR SHARE

Midwestern Intermediate Unit includes all public school districts in Butler, Lawrence, and Mercer counties. These public schools serve all students including those who have been identified as needing Special Education services. The special education needs of the children are variable, and by law, regulations, mandates, and legal decisions it is incumbent on the MIU IV school districts to provide a variety of special education programs. "Fair Share" program is established to insure that the needs of Special Education children are met in a thorough and efficient manner. The program is designed with the premise that all school districts in the MIU IV have a responsibility to share in the responsibility of educating children with special education needs.

<u>Host School</u> – "Host school" as used in the context of this document is defined as the School District that is housing a special education class operated by the Intermediate Unit and/or a District operating a Special Education class that enrolls Special Education children from other school districts.

<u>Fair Share Payment</u> — "Fair share payment" as used in the context of this document is defined as payment, in addition to tuition payment, a school district makes to a host school district for providing educational facilities and services to students with special education needs.

<u>District or Mainstream Days</u> — "District or Mainstream days" as used in the context of this document is defined as the number of days credited to the host school, by the I.U. or School District, for providing educational services to special education children in classes conducted by the host school outside of the special education classroom. Note: The term "district days" is used by the I.U. The number of district/mainstream days is multiplied by the host school's daily elementary or secondary tuition rate.

Base Days – the "Base days" as used in the context of this document is defined as the number of days (180, 179, 178, etc.) that determines the base for fair share time, and daily elementary and secondary tuition rate. (Base Day may not be uniform due to Act 80)

<u>Tuition Rate</u> – "Tuition rate" as used in the context of this document is defined as the elementary or secondary tuition rate established for the host school by the Department of Education. The yearly tuition rate shall be divided by the "base days" to determine the daily tuition rate.

<u>Prorated Time</u> – "Prorated time" as used in the context of this document is defined as the amount of fair share time (number of days) used to determine amount of fair share payment. Prorated time will be used only when a non-resident student attends a special education class in a host school district less than 180 days.

Fair Share Agreement June 2014

The following "Fair Share Payment" will be applied by all public schools in the MIU IV for Special Education classes.

The Special Education classes currently include:

- 1. HIS Hearing Impaired Support
- 2. LSS Life Skills Support
- 3. MDS Multi-Disability Support
- 4. AUT Autistic Support
- 5. ES Emotional Support

The "Fair Share Payment" will be recalculated every three years using the most recent PDE-2061 form. All Districts will submit page 3, overhead cost, from PDE-2061 by June 1st every three years to the MIU IV. The calculation will be as follows:

- 1. Add overhead cost of all Districts.
- 2. Divide this number by the total number of Districts.
- 3. Use 50% of the amount calculated from #2 for "Fair Share Payment" per pupil.

The amount of 50% was used because District tuition rates calculated on PDE-2061 already include overhead costs for mainstreaming.

The recalculation will occur during the summers of 2014, 2017, 2020, etc. The calculation will be rounded up to the nearest hundred dollars. See Appendix A for the calculated amount for the 2014-2015 fiscal year. Appendix B is an example of how the amount will be calculated.

This Agreement will become effective for the 2014-2015 school year.

The following "Fair Share Payment" will be applied by school districts located in Butler, Lawrence, and Mercer Counties:

The 2014-2015 tuition rate was determined to be \$1,600.00 (See Appendix B)
